








2023 Snapshot of Events & Activities

- Activated over 143 calendar days in 2023
- Alive After 5 rocked The Grove Plaza for it's 36th season including a collaboration with Duck Club and Valiant Productions, and a commitment to a sustainably-minded beverage program
- The annual Father's Day Car Show resumed with a new location in front of our State Capitol and an estimated 12,000 attendees
- The third year of **Supersized First Thursdays**
- Downtown Plays added multi-generational play to downtown experiences for it's second year adding on story times partnering with Rediscovered Books
- **State of Downtown** had record-breaking attendance bringing a nationally recognized speaker on cities into our downtown





2023 Snapshot of Events & Activities

- Game Day Shuttle brought BSU fans into our downtown before and after games
- Participated and lead Park(ing) Day throughout downtown
- **Taste of Downtown** was held for its 13th year
- **Small Business Saturday** highlighted downtown's 96% locally-owned offerings
- The holiday season kicked off with over 4,000 attendees at the Holiday Tree Lighting and over 5,000 gift tags supporting WCA
- **Glide on Grove** added 40+ days of free activity to the holiday and post-holiday season
- Over 300 volunteers gave around 2,200 hours to our downtown and events

DBA Programs in 2023

- Hung almost **1,000 banners** throughout downtown
- Coordinated with City and Artist Bobby Gaytan to paint the 8th Street Barriers
- Planted 534 flowerpots up to 545 predicted in 2024 due to new development and beautification projects (56 specifically allocated to CCDC)
- The Downtown Maintenance Team worked over 8,500
 hours keeping our downtown clean and safe
- Distributed **45,000 Map & Directories** a 30% increase from 2022
- DBA sold almost **\$300k** in Downtown Gift Cards
- The holidays were made extra bright with new swags on streetlights, all new LED-lit wreaths, and almost 350 streetlights wrapped with lights


Project Background and Scope

Background

- One general use elevator
- The estimated life cycle of a traction elevator is 15-20 years
- Current elevator is ~19-20 years old
- Replacement parts difficult to procure

Project Scope

- Modernization will replace all major elevator components
- New control room to be built
- Modernization will provide 15-20 years of additional elevator service life
